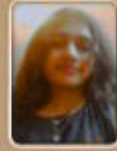

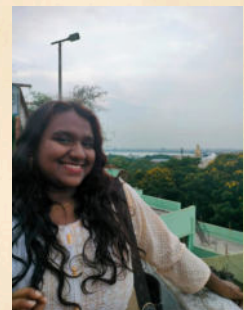
## **June 26: A Day of Awareness and Solidarity**

June 26 is marked globally for two significant causes: the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking and the International Day in Support of Victims of Torture. Both observances, declared by the United Nations, aim to raise awareness about serious human rights and public health issues affecting individuals and societies worldwide.

The International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking was established in 1987 to strengthen action and cooperation in achieving a drug-free world. Drug abuse remains a major global challenge, affecting millions of lives through health crises, broken families, and lost opportunities. Each year, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) selects a theme to focus efforts and awareness. Campaigns around the world promote prevention, education, rehabilitation, and support for affected individuals. Schools, colleges, and community organisations often conduct talks, street plays, and outreach programmes to educate youth about the risks of drug addiction and the importance of making healthy choices.

On the same day, the world observes the International Day in Support of Victims of Torture, declared in 1997. It also honours the strength and resilience of survivors and emphasises the global need for justice, healing, and rehabilitation. ## **Bakrid: Honouring Faith Through Sacrifice**

Bakrid, also known as Eid al-Adha, is one of the two major Islamic festivals celebrated by Muslims across the world. It falls on the 10th day of Dhu al-Hijjah, the final month of the Islamic lunar calendar, and marks the end of the annual Hajj pilgrimage to Mecca. In 2025, Bakrid is expected to be celebrated on June 7, although the exact date may vary depending on moon sightings.

The festival commemorates the deep faith of Prophet Ibrahim (Abraham), who was prepared to sacrifice his son Ismail (Ishmael) as an act of obedience to God. However, God intervened and replaced the child with a ram, symbolising that true devotion lies in intention, not just action. To honour this act of submission, Muslims around the world perform Qurbani, the ritual sacrifice of an animal such as a goat, sheep, or cow.

The meat from the sacrifice is divided into three parts—one-third for the family, one-third for friends and relatives, and one-third for the needy. This practice reinforces the values of sharing, charity, and community responsibility, which are central to Islamic teachings.

On the morning of Bakrid, Muslims gather for a special Eid prayer, usually held in open spaces or mosques. People wear new clothes, greet each other with "Eid Mubarak", and enjoy festive meals with family and friends. Children often receive gifts and sweets, and homes are filled with warmth and celebration.

More than a ritual, Bakrid is a reminder of the importance of faith, sacrifice, and compassion. It encourages people to help those in need, forgive, and strengthen social bonds. As the day brings communities together, its true essence lies in humility, kindness, and devotion.

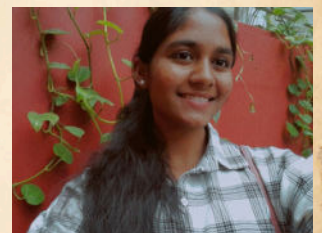

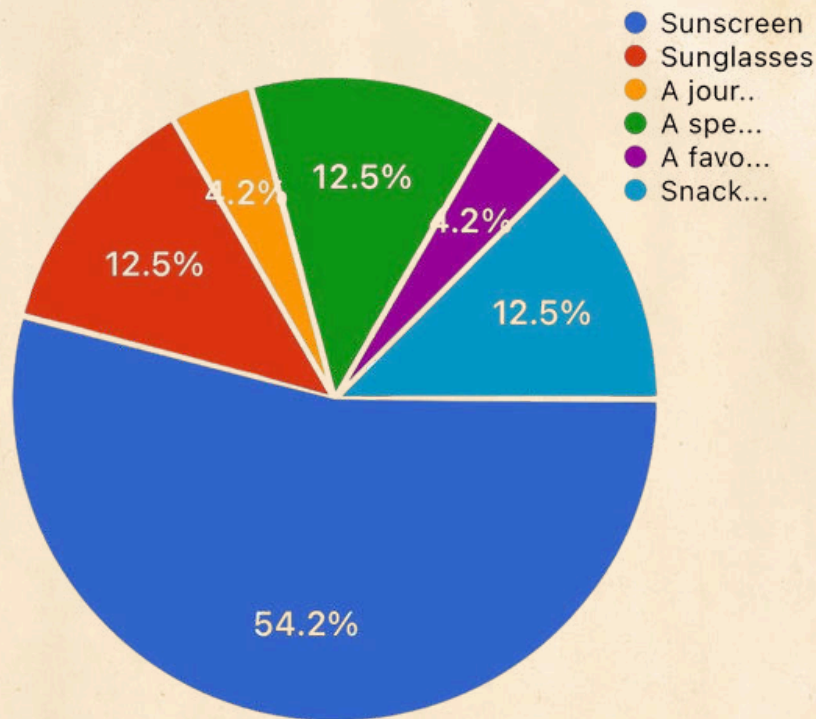

## **Autistic Pride Day: Celebrating Neurodiversity**

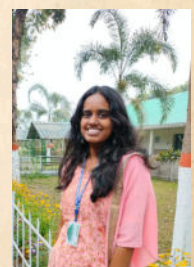
Autistic Pride Day, observed every year on June 18, is a day dedicated to recognising and celebrating the uniqueness of individuals on the autism spectrum. First celebrated in 2005 by the group Aspies For Freedom, the day challenges common stereotypes and emphasises that autism is not a disorder to be “fixed”, but a different way of experiencing the world.

Unlike awareness days that often focus on difficulties or medical aspects, Autistic Pride Day highlights the strengths, talents, and perspectives of autistic individuals. It shifts the conversation from pity to pride, from limitation to acceptance. The use of a rainbow infinity symbol for the day reflects the diversity within the autism spectrum and the infinite possibilities for people with autism.

Autism, or Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), affects how a person communicates, interacts, and processes information. But these differences often come with unique abilities—such as deep focus, attention to detail, creativity, and strong memory skills. Autistic individuals contribute meaningfully across fields such as science, art, music, and technology when given the right support and understanding.

One of the most powerful aspects of Autistic Pride Day is that it is led by the autistic community itself. It is not about raising awareness from the outside but about creating space for voices within the community to be heard and respected. It encourages families, schools, and workplaces to foster inclusion rather than isolation and to move beyond labels and assumptions.

Autistic Pride Day reminds us that difference is not deficiency. Embracing neurodiversity enriches our communities and opens minds to new ways of thinking. In celebrating this day, we take a step closer to a more inclusive and compassionate world—one where everyone, regardless of how they experience life, is valued and accepted.

# World Blood Donor Day

World Blood Donor Day (WBDD) is held on June 14 each year. The event was organised for the first time in 2004 by four core international organisations: the World Health Organisation, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, the International Federation of Blood Donor Organisations (IFBDO) and the International Society of Blood Transfusion (ISBT) to raise awareness of the need for safe blood and blood products and to thank blood donors for their voluntary, life-saving gifts of blood. World Blood Donor Day is one of 11 official global public health campaigns marked by the World Health Organisation (WHO), along with World Health Day, World Chagas Disease Day, World Tuberculosis Day, World Immunisation Week, World Patient Safety Day, World Malaria Day, World No Tobacco Day, World Hepatitis Day, World Antimicrobial Awareness Week and World AIDS Day.

Blood is a necessary resource for the planned treatments and the urgent interventions. It is helpful for patients who are suffering from life-threatening conditions to live longer and with a higher quality of life. It supports complex medical and surgical procedures.

Transfusion of blood and blood products helps and saves millions of lives every year. It can help patients who are suffering from life-threatening conditions live longer and with a higher quality of life and supports complex medical and surgical procedures. It also has an essential, life-saving role in maternal and perinatal care. Access to safe and sufficient blood and blood products can help reduce rates of death and disability due to severe bleeding during delivery and after childbirth.

In many countries, there is not an adequate supply of safe blood, and blood services face the challenge of making sufficient blood available while also ensuring its quality and safety.

What can we do?

- Be a voluntary blood donor and an inspiration to others.
- Commit to being a regular donor and give blood throughout the year.
- Encourage your friends and family to become regular blood donors.
- Volunteer with the blood service to reach out to members of your community, provide care to donors, and help manage blood donation sessions/drives.
- Find out your blood type and register as a blood donor.
- Participate in World Blood Donor Day with your social networks.



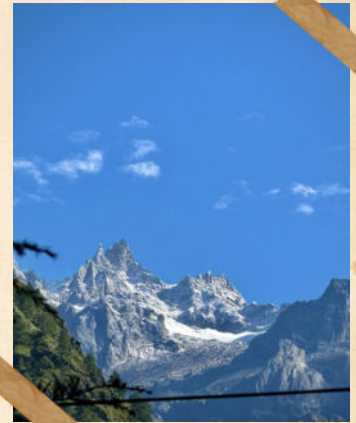

## HOW TO DIY

Here's a step-by-step guide to making a simple homemade bird feeder using a plastic bottle—a great, eco-friendly project that's perfect for beginners and kids with adult supervision .

### DIY Plastic Bottle Bird Feeder

#### Materials Needed

- 1 empty plastic bottle (500ml–2L)
- 2 wooden spoons or sticks (for perches)
- Craft knife or scissors
- Birdseed
- String or wire (for hanging)
- Funnel (optional)



#### Step-by-Step Instructions

##### Step 1: Clean the Bottle

Rinse out the bottle thoroughly with warm water and soap. Let it dry completely before using.

##### Step 2: Make Perch Holes

Use a knife to carefully make a hole about 2 inches above the base of the bottle. Do the same directly on the opposite side. Insert a wooden spoon through the bottle so it sticks out both sides.

##### Step 3: Create Seed Openings

Just above each perch/spoon, cut a small hole (about 1 cm wide). These holes will allow seeds to spill out onto the spoon slowly as birds eat.

##### Step 4: Add a Second Perch (Optional)

Repeat Steps 2 and 3 higher up the bottle for a second perch and seed opening.

##### Step 5: Add Hanging String

Poke two holes near the neck of the bottle or through the bottle cap. Thread a string or wire through and tie securely to hang the feeder.

##### Step 6: Fill with Seed

Remove the cap or use a funnel to pour in birdseed. Fill about three-quarters full. Screw the cap back on if needed.

##### Step 7: Hang the Feeder

Hang from a tree branch, hook, or pole. Choose a quiet, safe area away from predators and heavy winds. Ideally, place near shrubs or trees so birds feel protected.

##### Step 8: Maintenance

Refill when low: Keep seeds fresh and plentiful.

Clean weekly: Remove old seed, wash with warm soapy water, rinse thoroughly, and dry before refilling.

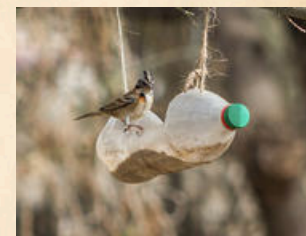
Watch for mold or pests.

#### Bonus Tips

Use black oil sunflower seeds or millet to attract more birds.

Make sure the perches are strong enough to hold small birds.

Consider adding a shallow dish under the feeder to catch falling seeds.



## **FROM BLOODSHED TO BATTLEFIELD:- STORY OF OPERATION SINDOOR**

### **BACKGROUND THE PAHALGAM TERROR ATTACK**

On April 22, 2025, terror struck the serene slopes of Baisaran Valley, a popular tourist spot in Pahalgam town, Anantnag district of Jammu and Kashmir. In a brutal assault, five heavily armed terrorists opened fire on civilians, deliberately targeting non-Muslim tourists. The carnage left 26 dead and 17 others grievously injured. The attackers included three Pakistani nationals - SULEMAN SHAH, ALI BHAI alias TALHA, and ASIF FAUJI along with two local militants, ADIL GURI from Anantnag and AHSAN from Pulwama. Among the fallen was SYED ADIL HUSSAIN SHAH, a local resident hailed as a hero for dying while trying to shield and evacuate tourists amid the chaos.

### **MASTER MINDS BEHIND PAHALGAM ATTACK**

### **INDIA'S IMMEDIATE RESPONSE**

On 23rd April 2025, Ministry of External Affairs had taken several steps as a response to Pahalgam terror

1. Suspension of INDUS WATER TREATY - where pakistan gets 80% of indus river water
2. Closure of ATTARI WAGAH BORDER
3. Ban on pakistani nationals entering India
4. Expulsion of pakistani military advisors from new delhi
5. Reduction of high commission staff strength
6. Indian counterparts in islamabad were withdrawn

On 7th May 2025, India gave a call for war mock drills across the country in 259 cities, includes hyderabad

### **OPERATION SINDOOR**

In a swift and lethal midnight operation on May 7, 2025, at 1:44 AM, the Indian Army struck with precision using Rafale fighter jets and SCALP cruise missiles to destroy nine terrorist infrastructure sites - including launch pads and training camps linked to Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT), Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM), and Hizbul Mujahideen(HM). In just 25 minutes, the operation eliminated 100 terrorists, marking one of the most decisive counter-terror actions in recent years. which Pakistan called as BLATANT ACT OF WAR

JeM chief MASOOD AZHAR lost his 10 family members residing in the Subhan Allah complex, Bahawalpur.

As a response to Operation Sindoor, Pakistan heavily fired on civilians of J&K using 400 Turkish drones in 200 minutes, resulting in 10 casualties and 33 injuries. The Indian army also retaliated by destroying Pakistan's Chinese air defense and opening the gates of the Baglihar Dam on the Chenab River, which flooded POK. During India's retaliation, 27 airports across West and North India were shut, and a blackout happened in Pakistan's targeted cities.

### **BREAKING BARRIERS, DELIVERING CLARITY:**

Colonel Sofia Qureshi and Wing Commander Vyomika Singh, along with Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri, jointly briefed the media on Operation Sindoor, marking a rare and powerful moment where two senior Indian female officers led the official communication on a major counter-terror operation.

### **CEASEFIRE**

On May 10, 2025, India and Pakistan declared a ceasefire after Pakistan's DGMO reached out to his Indian counterpart requesting a halt in hostilities. Despite initiating the truce, Pakistan celebrated it as a victory—only to violate the ceasefire three times consecutively. India responded with swift and calibrated retaliation. Officials confirmed that Operation Sindoor remains active and ongoing.

On May 12, 2025, Prime Minister Narendra Modi addressed the nation, declaring the success of Operation Sindoor and reaffirming India's firm stance on national security and territorial integrity.

In a strong statement, he said, "They wiped out the sindoor of our women; we wiped them out," referencing the brutal Pahalgam attack that triggered the operation.

He emphasized that Operation Sindoor will continue until all terrorist threats are eliminated, stating clearly that India will not tolerate external interference and that this is strictly a matter between India and Pakistan. The Prime Minister also made a bold declaration, asserting that India will not back down until it reclaims Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK).

His address underlined India's decisive military response, unwavering political resolve, and a clear message to both adversaries and the international community: India seeks peace, but not at the cost of its sovereignty or security.

### **QUESTION YET TO BE ANSWERED**

Did India really strike the Kirana Hills and Noor Khan Air Base in Pakistan, leading to nuclear radiation concerns? Is this the underlying reason for the ceasefire, or is there more to the story? Why did the US's Beech King Air 250 aircraft land in Pakistan, and what was the role of the Egyptian Air Force plane carrying boron to Pakistan?
